

OUR DISTRICT



Three Rivers is a thriving and diverse district in south-west Hertfordshire, named after the rivers Chess, Gade and Colne that flow through it. With a population of just under 94,000, it offers an outstanding quality of life, combining attractive countryside and waterways with welcoming towns and villages. The district includes parts of the Chilterns Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty, a rich network of parks and open spaces, and a proud heritage that shapes its distinctive character.

Its communities are the heart of what makes Three Rivers special. From Rickmansworth, Chorleywood and Croxley Green to Abbots Langley, South Oxhey and many smaller villages, each has its own identity and strong sense of local pride. Residents benefit from excellent schools, active community organisations, and a wide range of cultural, sporting and leisure opportunities. The district's location


provides outstanding transport connections into London and the wider region, while maintaining a close-knit community feel and abundant access to green space.

What the data tells us


The district has experienced steady growth, largely driven by natural change and inward migration from London and surrounding areas.

What it means for us

Ongoing population growth is expected to drive increased demand for housing across the district, including a greater need for affordable housing options. This growth is also likely to place additional pressure on health and leisure facilities, parks and open spaces, and sustainable transport options.

The district's age structure broadly mirrors national averages, but the proportion of older people is projected to rise further.

What it means for us

The council must plan for an ageing population, ensuring access to appropriate housing, increasing access to health and leisure facilities and community spaces, while also continuing to provide these opportunities for younger families.

What the data tells us

Whilst the figures tell us that Three Rivers is more diverse than the national picture, it is important to note that certain ethnicities are still underrepresented in the district when compared to national figures. We are also aware that there are likely 'hidden' communities within the district of those who do not feel comfortable to disclose their ethnicity.

What it means for us

We must ensure council services are delivered equitably, acknowledging the underrepresentation of certain ethnicities, while promoting inclusive communities and encouraging resident participation to help address potential inequalities.

What the data tells us

House prices and rents in Three Rivers are significantly above national averages, reflecting strong demand linked to commuter access to London.

What it means for us

Housing affordability is a major issue. The council must continue to prioritise working with partners to deliver affordable housing, ensuring a mix of tenure and property types to reflect the changing characteristics of the people who live and work in the district.

What the data tells us

Access to green space in Three Rivers is significantly better than the national average. Popular assets include Rickmansworth Aquadrome, Chorleywood Common, and Leavesden Country Park.

What it means for us

The district's green assets are a defining strength. Protecting, enhancing, and integrating these spaces into health, wellbeing, and climate strategies will remain a priority.

The local economy is strong, with lower levels of unemployment compared to the national average and a thriving base of small to medium size enterprises.


What it means for us

WHERE OUR MONEY COMES FROM



The council manage a portfolio of commercial property which **generates around £1.7 million** of rental income every year.

In addition, the council owns and manage **1,056 garages across the district** producing an average income of **over £1million every year.**

The council also owns and manages a small portfolio of investment premises, which directly support the delivery of our services. These assets provide a average **yearly income of £2.6 million.**

WHAT IS A COUNCIL PLAN

The Council Plan is our overarching strategy that shapes our priorities and actions. It sets out our goals for the district and ensures we focus our time and resources where they're needed. This is especially crucial in the face of external economic pressure and increasing demand. The Plan informs our service planning and guides the development of Key Performance Indicators (KPIs) that will be aligned with our themes and aims. These KPIs will help us monitor progress throughout the lifetime of the Plan and ensure that the council remains accountable to our commitments. Performance of the council against these KPIs will be reviewed quarterly by the senior leadership of the council and our elected councillors.

HOW THE PLAN WAS DEVELOPED

The development of this plan has been informed by a broad and diverse range of insights, experiences, and evidence. We have built on the strong foundations and achievements of our previous Corporate Framework, taking forward what has worked well, while also identifying areas for improvement. This continuity has allowed us to develop a forward-looking plan that remains rooted in the progress we have already made, while being responsive to the changing needs of the district.

Listening to the voices of our communities has been central to this process. We reviewed feedback from our previous resident surveys, placing particular emphasis on our most recent survey, which received a record number of responses from our residents. Importantly, this has given us a clear, current, and detailed understanding of what matters most to local people. The insights we gained have helped

shape the priorities and focus areas of this plan in a way that reflects our communities' needs and aspirations.

We have drawn on a wide range of research and analysis, gathered by both the council and external researchers. This work has helped us understand wider social, economic, and environmental trends, as well as emerging challenges and opportunities that may impact our district moving forward. By considering both local data and broader evidence, we have been able to ensure that the plan is not only responsive to current concerns but also forward-thinking and resilient.




HEALTHY, SAFE AND THRIVING COMMUNITIES



Our plan sets out a clear commitment to supporting communities across Three Rivers where everyone feels safe, connected, and able to live well. We want to create places where residents of all ages can access the health services, leisure facilities, and community spaces they need to lead healthy and active lives.

A key part of this is ensuring access to safe, secure, and affordable homes. In the UK, affordable housing refers to homes provided at a cost below the market rate - either for rent or sale - including social rent, affordable rent, and shared ownership. These homes are designed to meet the needs of people who cannot afford to buy or rent at full market prices, including key workers, young people, and lower-income households.

The council recognise that access to quality housing is a critical determinant of health. Poor or insecure housing can contribute to a wide range of physical and mental health issues, from respiratory illnesses linked to significant damp and mould within a property, to stress and anxiety caused by overcrowding or housing instability. Providing safe, secure and affordable homes means better health outcomes, allowing our residents to thrive, whilst reducing reliance on health and social care services.

We will continue to work closely with developers and housing providers in the district to increase the supply of this affordable housing across the district.

While increasing the availability of affordable housing, we also remain focused on preventing and relieving homelessness. Homelessness has a profound impact on health and wellbeing and people experiencing homelessness are significantly more likely to face poor mental health, chronic physical conditions, and reduced life expectancy. The prevention and relief of homelessness is not only a housing issue, but a critical part of improving health outcomes across our communities. Through early intervention and targeted, practical support, we will continue working hard to make sure no one facing these hardships are left without help.

The council are proud to be a key member of the Community Safety Partnership in Three Rivers and will continue to work alongside Hertfordshire Constabulary, local partners and support services to keep crime and antisocial behaviour low. Where issues do occur, we will take a victim-centred approach, offering support to our residents and communities until a fair and lasting resolution is found. A victim-centred approach will also be taken when supporting residents affected by domestic abuse. The council holds White Ribbon Accreditation and remains committed to helping victims through the actions set out in our White Ribbon Action Plan.

Our Planning Officers and elected councillors will continue to support planning applications that promote well-designed, inclusive communities and a healthier local environment. By collaborating with the voluntary and community sector, we are also working to support the most vulnerable members of our communities, making sure support is there when it is needed.

Finally, we will actively pursue external funding to support key projects and services - so we can continue investing in the wellbeing, safety, and resilience of our communities now, and in the years ahead.



A GREEN AND SUSTAINABLE FUTURE

We are committed to creating a greener, more sustainable future for everyone who lives, works, and visits Three Rivers. The Three Rivers Council Plan strengthens this commitment by setting out clear actions to reduce emissions, protect nature, build resilience to climate change, and support sustainable economic growth. Since declaring a climate emergency in 2019, the council has led by example on local projects that reduce emissions, support biodiversity and help our communities adapt to the growing impacts of a changing climate.

Both mitigation and adaptation are crucial to the council's response to climate change locally. To ensure the council's action on climate change reflects the priorities and concerns of our diverse communities, we held our Community Conversations climate change consultation (facilitated by the public participation charity Involve) in Spring 2025. This consultation generated numerous recommendations for action from the participating residents. These have been embedded within this Council Plan and the council's Climate Emergency and Sustainability Strategy and Action Plan to help us work towards our ambitious target of Three Rivers being a net zero district by 2045.

Nature and green space are at the heart of the communities across Three Rivers. The district is home to a kaleidoscope of parks, open spaces and recreational areas, including two nationally recognised Green Flag sites: Rickmansworth Aquadrome and Leavesden Country Park. We are continuing to invest in these vital green spaces - including a major improvement project currently underway at Rickmansworth Aquadrome that will continue over the course of this plan, supported by more than £1.5million in externally secured funding. We plan to continue delivering targeted work through our Biodiversity Policy, Local Nature Recovery Strategy, and Tree Strategy to restore nature, protect habitats like chalk streams and woodlands, and create more biodiversity-friendly spaces across the district.

Three Rivers remains one of the top-performing recycling authorities in England, and we will continue to build on that success, while also

encouraging more sustainable lifestyles. We will invest in our parks, walking routes and open spaces to make them more accessible and appealing for everyone.

Our commitment to sustainability starts with improving our own operations. We are working to reduce the council's carbon footprint through energy efficiency upgrades to council buildings and investment in renewable energy solutions to which will provide long-term cost savings, energy security, and significant emissions reductions.

Outside of our own operations, the council will enable and inspire a greener district by supporting energy efficiency improvements to local homes and businesses through the provision of grants and expert advice, and delivering an active programme of forums, events and initiatives to promote sustainable living.

We are also supporting cleaner, greener ways to travel. This includes installing more EV charging points in council-owned car parks, upgrading facilities to support active travel, and working with partners on projects like the Local Cycling and Walking Infrastructure Plan (LCWIP) to make sustainable transport easier, safer, and more attractive.

Whilst delivering the new homes we need in the district, the new Local Plan will play a central role in shaping a sustainable future for Three Rivers - working to secure homes with high standards of water and energy efficiency that are well adapted to a changing climate, while protecting and enhancing biodiversity. This work will be progressed over the course of the plan and will see the delivery of the new Local Plan in late 2026 or early 2027.

Through our strong network of partnerships, we are embedding sustainability into everything we do - from planning and infrastructure, to how we deliver everyday services. Together, we are building a greener, more sustainable and resilient Three Rivers for current and future generations.

Three Rivers is home to a diverse and growing economy, hosting several national and international headquarters, including the world-renowned Warner Bros. Studios Leavesden. The council are committed to ensuring the district remains an attractive place for businesses to invest, grow, and thrive - supported by excellent transport links, a skilled workforce, and a strong sense of community.

Our high streets are vital to local life. They are not just centres for commerce but provide vital social and cultural hubs at the heart of our communities. While recent years have brought major challenges for retailers and service providers, we are determined to support the ongoing renewal of these much-loved spaces. We will continue working with local businesses, town and parish councils, and wider partners to breathe new life into our high streets - including exploring new markets, events, and initiatives that boost footfall and create vibrant, welcoming town centres.

We understand the challenges many local businesses face - from high housing costs in our district, to national skills shortages and rising energy bills. While many of these issues require action at a national level, we can support our local businesses by making Three Rivers a great place to live, work and visit - with high-quality leisure, culture, and recreational opportunities, a clean and green environment, and a council that works in partnership with the business community.

We remain committed to attracting and retaining investment and will continue to build strong relationships with local businesses. We will also work with transport authorities to improve the ways people move around the district, helping both residents and visitors access local shops, services, and employment opportunities more easily.

Through effective policies, we will continue to approve licences that support local enterprise and community activity. We will ensure that we collect any available Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) funding payable to the council efficiently and use

this funding to deliver improvements that benefit residents and strengthen our local economy.

Recognising the power of local culture to enrich communities and drive economic growth, we will continue to celebrate and invest in the arts, heritage and creative sectors across the district - supporting events and organisations that bring people together and enhance our shared sense of place.

The council is also focused on creating an inclusive, fair and welcoming district. Through our Equality, Diversity and Inclusion Policy, we are working to ensure all residents can access our services and participate in local life. We'll continue promoting inclusive communities, increasing participation, and collaborating with partners to deliver shared economic, environmental, and social goals.

Together, these efforts support our vision of a prosperous and vibrant Three Rivers - a place where businesses can flourish, culture is celebrated, and every resident can thrive.
